Bicentennial Celebration

Plans are nearly complete for the June 9-10 Town of Austerlitz Bicentennial Celebration!

Saturday activities will kick off with a bell ringing before the parade. The parade will form along Route 7 and begin at noon with marchers moving down Route 203, around the green to the new town hall. The new town hall will be dedicated and short speeches will be offered. The parade will have fire trucks, bands, floats, unicyclists, wagons, and other entertainment. The Spencertown Academy and St. Peter's Presbyterian Church will be open with historical displays. There will be hot dogs, and burgers at the Town Park as well as music. A recognition of Revolutionary War veterans is also planned.

Mugs and T-shirts emblazoned with the new town seal will be available for purchase. Be sure and bring a stamped envelope and get a cancellation recognizing 1818-2018 Bicentennial.

The newly published book-*Old Houses of Austerlitz* will be available for purchase. Other activities include house tours of homes from the book- *Old Houses of Austerlitz* and recognition of the descendants of early settlers. Tours will be held in Spencertown on Saturday and Austerlitz on Sunday.

Sunday will have historic exhibits at Old Austerlitz and an old car show at the Austerlitz Fire House along with hamburgers and hot dogs provided by the fire company.

Historical but not Austerlitz

It's that time of year when driving unpaved roads coats cars and no matter how many times we wash them or how careful we are, the mud can get on us too. People may not believe this; it used to be much worse. My grandfather, Frank Wambach, was born in Austerlitz in 1885 and told me that in horse and buggy days the mud could suck the iron shoes right off the horses' hooves. I can attest to this happening to our saddle horses which was an expensive occurrence even 50 years ago.

When I was a child of about 5, we were warned not to play in deep mud. Naturally, as the oldest child, I convinced my two younger sisters that nothing would happen and to just follow me. We put on our little rubber boots and off we went just east of the barn and into the muddy farm road. The mud was about 10 in. We went up to nearly the tops of our boots and we got stuck. We tried and tried to no avail, and it was too cold to pull out our feet and go home barefoot. Finally we started yelling as loud as we could and our father came out of the barn and pulled us out. He was pretty upset and as the ringleader I remember getting spanked, a perfectly reasonable punishment back then.

My riding on local roads started about that time too. My father had to take ours and several other neighboring farms' cans of milk up to the Borden Plant just south of Chatham. He often took me with him and the spring trips could be wild. We would slow down while he looked at the quagmire ahead, and taught me his strategies to get the loaded truck through. We rode the tops of ruts, went to either side of the road, sometimes off the road, sometimes speeding up and always got through. Thankfully our roads are now ditched, raised, and maintained, even if they still get a light coating of mud. The good part of growing up here is that I now know how to drive through almost anything, and will never wade into the mud in rubber boots.

The Society's New Book: "The Old Houses of Austerlitz"

Coincident with the bicentennial weekend, the Society will be releasing its new book.

The Old Houses of Austerlitz The History and Early Architecture of a Rural New York Town

This is a big book about a small town. Six years in the making, it is 396 pages, in color, and includes:

a 40 page history of the town, from the 1750s to the present, by Town Historian Tom Moreland;

a 25 page monograph on the architectural styles of the town's historic houses, by Society trustee and architectural historian Michael Rebic;

individual histories of each of the 168 buildings (157 of them houses) in the town that date from 1760 to 1888, tracing ownership, with deed and mortgage citations and other available evidence, from the earliest record to the present;

over 70 historical photographs, in addition to contemporary photos of all 168 buildings profiled, including many interiors;

20 short articles on various local history topics, e.g.: the old roads of Austerlitz; one-room schools; African Americans in Austerlitz; Edna St. Vincent Millay; Ellsworth Kelly; Oscar Beckwith (a/k/a the "Austerlitz Cannibal"); Kinneville; the Brown store.

The book has been funded by a grant from Furthermore, a program of the J.M. Kaplan Fund, and donations from fourteen town residents, so all sales proceeds will benefit the Society.

The price for this hard cover book will be \$35, but only \$25 for paid-up members of the Society.

It will be available during the June 9-10 bicentennial weekend, and thereafter from the Society.
