HISTORIC MARKERS UNVEILED

Tom Moreland, Town Historian



During the bicentennial weekend, five new historic markers for the Town were unveiled. Selected by the Town bicentennial committee, the Society's Research Committee and the Town Historian. They are:

Pratt house. Now the Van Alstyne residence, bordering on the Punsit Creek at the north end of Spencertown, this Georgian style house was constructed in 1777 for Col. David Pratt. Pratt was a Revolutionary War veteran and an important civic leader, including as a moving force behind state legislation in 1793 that cleared local land titles in this former "land of contention."

Old Corner Store. Today the offices of Johnnie Walker Insurance, this building at the corner of Route 203 and Elm Street was a general store from around 1800 until 1951, and then the site of Ed Mesick's community auctions to 1975.

Early Tavern. On Route 22 in Austerlitz, now the Walter residence, this c. 1800 building was the hamlet's hotel/tavern from the early 1800s to the 1950s, most notably as the Harvey Hotel (1870-c. 1915) and the Columbia Inn (1921-51).

Peter Wheeler site. This marker on Dugway Road honors Peter Wheeler, an escaped slave who settled in Spencertown in 1825 and whose important 1839 autobiography, "Chains and Freedom," was recently reissued.

Mary Clark House. On Route 9, now the Littrell/Tehrani residence, this was the home of Dr. Mary Clark (1845-1937), pioneering female physician and strong supporter of the Methodist Church. The site was owned in the 1700s by Nehemiah Spencer, one of the 1756 Spencers Town proprietors.

These markers are funded by the William Pomeroy Foundation, which in essence has replaced the State of New York as the funding source for local historic markers. 
THE 19th ANNUAL BLUEBERRY FESTIVAL

Over 2,000 came out to enjoy the festivities on what turned out to be one of the nicest days of the summer.



On August 5th the Austerlitz Historical Society held a workshop: INTRODUCTION TO FERMENTATION.

Taught by Mark Phillips of Berkshire Ferments and Hosta Hill, the attendees learned how to safely ferment vegetables at home using sauerkraut as an example. We chopped our cabbage on the porch, in the old kitchen and in the new kitchen, chatted with those next to us and took home a quart mason jar of salty cabbage waiting for the process to commence. We can begin taste testing around the 1st of September.
